## Tasks (Can be completed in any order)

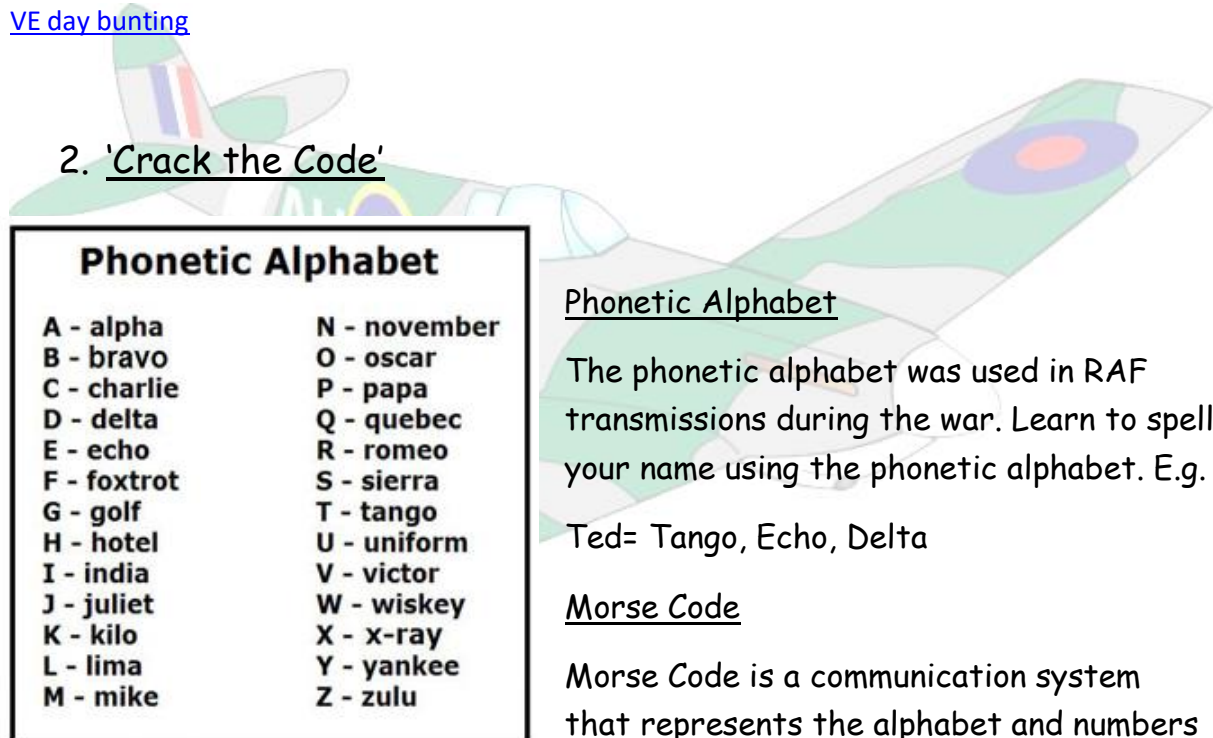
### 1. 'Stay at home' street party!

The phonetic alphabet was used in RAF transmissions during the war. Learn to spell your name using the phonetic alphabet. E.g.

Ted= Tango, Echo, Delta

Morse Code is a communication system that represents the alphabet and numbers with a series of dots, dashes or a

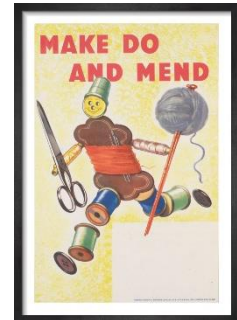
combination of both. *Can you write a secret coded message for your family to crack?*
