Where are the Ancient Greeks from?

★ The ancient Greeks lived in Greece, a country in southern Europe which is still around today.



Modern Greece is in Europe, and is situated on the Mediterranean Sea, between Italy and Turkey. The country is made up of a mainland and over 2000 islands. It has many beaches, mountains and islands and its capital city, Athens, has an average temperature of 26 degrees. The people who live there are called Greeks.



A closer look...

★ The close-up map shows how Greece is made up of one large island, and lots of smaller islands.
★ The dots on the map show the major cities of Athens (the capital

> of modern day Greece), Sparta and Troy – we'll be learning about all of these places as part of our topic.
