<u>Remember</u>

- Usually three sentences long, although they may be very long sentences. This is good practice for subordinate clauses and lengthy sentences.
- In addition to the three sentences, there may be a short quote from someone involved in the story.
- You cannot refer to anything that the listener needs to see – as they can only listen.
- Due to the fact that the listener cannot see anything, your description needs to be really good.
- Listen to some news bulletins before you have a go at your own.
